Why become an author?

Authorship is the primary basis academics use to evaluate talent

- Used as a basis for promotion
- Action breeds confidence

- Your skills





 - Join ITHS Journal Club



How can I even get started?

The first step is to say you can

- Contribute
 - Write an SOP/MOP
 - Be helpful, offer to write up study procedures
 - Contribute to progress reports
 - Be helpful, offer to draft sections
 - Participate in grant applications
 - Be helpful, offer to complete, compile, draft
 - Ask your PI for suggestions



What are manuscript submission guidelines?

Manuscripts follow a standard format

- Manuscript format
 - Abstract
 - 6-10 sentence summary
 - Introduction
 - What was the problem/observation
 - Methods and materials
 - How was problem solved/resolved/light cast upon it
 - Discussion
 - What does it all mean?
 - Title
 - Short, specific, pithy main subject





Where do I find the right journal for my article?

Begin with non-peer reviewed publications and match the content to the journal audience

 - Online
 - Journal of Clinical Best Practices
 - Perspectives in clinical Research
 - Journal of Clinical Research and Bioethics
 - RC professional publications
 - Clinical Researcher (formerly The Monitor)- ACRP
 - SOCRA Source (Society of Clinical Research Associates)
 - ClinPage
 - Journal finders

Where do I find the right journal for my article?

Next stop.....peer reviewed publications

- Scientific community reviewed publications
 - Almost always require PI participation and input
 - Almost always have multiple authors
 - Journal format is highly specific
 - Many more "back and forth" for final copy
 - Permission may be required by research consortiums
